The LEA contracts with a translator to translate letters and other documents as needed. Schools send documents going home to parents that need to be translated to the Title I department for translation and review, as needed. In addition, translators will be available when needed at parent meetings to provide translation services to ensure parents are able to fully participate in parent meetings. Additionally, the district has made available for each school complete sets of Unicom Translation Systems for use during parent meetings.
