Response: The LEA has a District Parent Involvement Policy/Plan Committee (DPIPC). Parents from Title I schools, parents of students at private schools receiving Title I funds, Family School Liaisons from Title I schools, community leaders, stakeholders, the Title I Parent Involvement Specialist, and the Title I Education Program Specialist will be represented on the committee. The Family School Liaisons and the parent representative will bring recommendations to the DPIPC from each Title I school. The purpose of the DPIPC will be to review, and/or revise the District Parent Involvement Policy/Plan and to make decisions regarding the use of Title I funds set aside for Parental Involvement. The DPIPC will meet four times during the school year at the convenience of the participants, at different times, days, and locations. To keep all parents informed of the committee's discussions, the Family School Liaison of each Title I school will keep a database of parent e-mails to send DPIPC meeting minutes. The minutes will also be posted on the Lake County District Title I website. Hard copies of the minutes will be available at the school site.

In addition to the DPIPC's input, parent input is also gathered from a parent survey which is posted on the Lake County Title I website in both English and Spanish and on each Title I school's website. Hard copies are also available at each Title I school. Family School Liaisons at each Title I school are responsible for encouraging parents to complete the survey. The survey results are analyzed and used to evaluate and revise the District Parent Involvement Policy/Plan. The revised DPIPC will be available at each Title I school and posted on the Lake County District Title I website. Parents can provide written comments or suggestions to the school or Title I Department, in addition to comments or suggestions provided at a school parent meeting.

Response: The LEA will continue to support and assist Title I, Part A schools in planning and implementing effective parental activities by retaining a Title I Parent Involvement Specialist along with a Title I Education Program Specialist who provides technical

assistance and monitors each Title I school's Parent Involvement program. Each Title I school also has an assigned Title I Program Specialist who conducts monthly technical assistance visits to include the review of Parent Involvement budget expenditures and activities. Title I schools are strongly encouraged to provide annually a minimum of three parent/student workshops based on the school's academic needs and best practices.

A Family School Liaison will be located at each Title I, Part A school and operate the school's Parent Resource Center to provide materials and resources for parents to check-out and use at home to help increase their child's academic achievement level. The Family School Liaison will also facilitate Parent Involvement activities and events based on the school's needs and best practices.
