Response: The Local Educational Agency (LEA) has developed the District Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council (EPAC), which is composed of parents from various Title I schools. Elections for the EPAC are held every two years during the Spring. Parent volunteers are nominated to serve as Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council officers and members. Elections are held by nominations of candidates. The Council consists of 18 voting members; with representation of parents from the north to the south sectors of the county; one Title I Staff member and an alternate Title I Staff member. The Council provides input into the development, implementation and evaluation of all district related plans, including but not limited to the District Improvement and Assistance Plan (DIAP), the LEA District's Parent Involvement Plan (PIP), the Title I, Part A application, and use of the set-aside allocation. The Broward LEA will present all projected district activities and expenditures for the upcoming school year to the district's Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council (EPAC) in May (notice of meetings dates will be mailed to council members). During the Title I EPAC meetings (March, May, and any call meetings that must be held to reach an agreeable consensus by the Council) members will review, provide recommendations and modifications regarding the projected parent involvement expenditures/activities and district parent involvement plan. The LEA and the Title I EPAC members are expected to reach consensus regarding the parent involvement expenditures and activities by June.

All schools receive training and information on ways to include parents in the school improvement process, school-level parental involvement plan, school-parent compact, and the activities of the school through the Title I Principals' Training and the Title I Liaisons' Technical Assistance Training;

- Parents are invited and encouraged to become active members of the SAC and provide input in the development and decision-making process of all plans related to school improvement. Parent, staff, and student surveys are distributed and the results analyzed to evaluate the school needs. Data collected throughout the year is shared with each SAC. The results are utilized to plan effective parental involvement activities for the new school term.

Decisions involving the use of the one percent of Title I funds reserved for parental involvement will be made during the development of the SIP by the SACs at the Title I schools. Parents of students in Title I schools are involved at their individual school's Council. Of the one percent, not less than 95% will be allocated to schools. Parents will participate in the development of the school's Title I budget through participation in the school's SAC meetings. The parent involvement activities will be developed with the input (recommendations and/or suggestions) of the parents. The LEA will monitor SAC membership to ensure that parents are represented and involved in the process.

- 6) Title I Parent Involvement Resource Center, which offers a welcoming atmosphere for parents, provides free educational resources and take-home materials. The materials are appropriate for grade levels Pre-K through 12;
- 7) Computer literacy training will also be provided through our Title I Parent Involvement Resource Center;
- 8) Coordinating an annual Parent Seminar with other federally funded grant programs, parents will attend academic concurrent sessions to improve literacy skills and school/community involvement. During this event parents will also receive valuable resources from community partners;
- 9) Partnership with the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition to institute the "Men-That-Care" initiative which actively employs male involvement with the mission to strengthen and provide training sessions for increased male participation;
- 10) Purchase current research-based instructional materials (for parent trainings, technical assistance training to schools, Parent Involvement Resource Center and mobile units).
- 11) Provide transportation for Title I parents to participate in district sponsored parent involvement events/activities.

12) Institute a summer learning initiative using the Title I mobile units, whereby the units will partner with various community camps to provide technology learning stations to Title I students.
