**Response:** The mission of the Title I Parent Involvement program is to promote high academic student achievement through technical assistance support and cutting edge parent involvement practices.

Response: The Hernando County School Title I program is committed to fostering parental involvement as required in Title I Part A [Section 1118(a)(2)]; [Sections 1112 (c)(H), 1112(d)(1)]; and [Sections 1116(a)(1)(D), 1116(b)(3)(A)]. In order to accomplish this goal, many activities will be supported at the Title I served schools with the involvement of parents in the development of the LEA plan and the process of school review and improvement. A Title I district-wide Family Engagement Team (FET) has been established to assist with this goal. The FET is composed of parents and educators representing the eleven Title I schools in the district. School level educators nominate parents to represent their school; and the school Principal selects the parents to become members of FET. Members of the FET are responsible for following the tasks:

- Develop, implement and evaluate various components of programs in our Title I School programs.
- Provide parental input in the development of plans related to Title I Part A: Section 1112, 1118 under No Child Left Behind. Inform the community of the purpose and intent of the law.
- · FET members attend bi-monthly meetings at the district office (scheduled for the months of September, November, January, March, and May).
- · Act as a liaison between the FET and Title I schools, and encourage other parents at their school to become actively involved in leadership committees; such as, School Advisory Council (SAC), Parent-Teacher Student Association (PTSA), Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO), and other school committees and activities.
- The Title I Coordinator of Family Engagement organizes and provides leadership for the FET meetings and promotes district family involvement initiatives and best practices. The twelve Parental Engagement Liaisons and eleven Title I Facilitators, located at each of the Title I schools, oversee parent involvement practices and activities at their sites. Effective parental involvement practices are coordinated and evaluated by each school's Title I Committee and Family Involvement Team (FIT). All the data collected from surveys, event response forms, and input given by parents at the FET meetings is also shared with the schools' Title I committees in order to maintain open and clear lines of communication and make appropriate decisions about the 95% allocated to the schools to carry out parent involvement activities and build capacity for parental involvement.
- The Supervisor of Title I ensures that a minimum of 1% of the Title I, Part A funds are allocated towards parental involvement services with 95% going to Title I, Part A schools. Schools use their 95% by hiring a school level Parent Educator to oversee a Family Resource Center and build capacity for strong parent involvement at the school and district level.

**Response:** The Supervisor of the Title I program and the Title I Coordinator of Family Engagement provide leadership, coordination, technical assistance and all other necessary support to the eleven Title I served schools in the district through the following strategies:

- · Facilitate through the Family Engagement Team (FET) the development of the district's Parental Involvement Plan; and distribute a summary of such plan to all participating parents under Title I Part A.
- · Facilitate at the school level an annual evaluation and review of the district's and school's Parental Involvement Plans in collaboration with the FET and each school's Title I Committee.
- · Reserve a minimum of 1% of the Title I, Part A allocation for parental engagement events with 95% going to Title I Part A, schools and facilitate the discussions for their expenditures.
- · Conduct quarterly meetings with the Parental Engagement Liaisons and Title I Facilitators to ensure compliance with all the requirements of Section 1118.

**Response:** The Title I team (FET Parents, Title I Committees, Supervisor of Title I Programs, Coordinator of Family Engagement, Parental Engagement Liaisons, Title I Facilitators and parents) will conduct several types of assessments to evaluate all the Title I parent engagement sponsored events, activities and trainings using the following strategies:

- Use of the Event Response form, from which the following data is obtained (parent's demographic and student school information such as (race/ethnicity, number of children in public school, participation in free or reduce lunch program, ESOL, ESE, SES and afterschool programs). This form is given to parents to complete after each parent involvement event and/or activity.
- · Use of the Parent Survey, given to parents during the months of January through mid March. The survey gathers information regarding parent satisfaction at the school level in the following areas: (parent support, parent-teacher communication, student and school assessment information). The results are shared with members of the Title I Committee at the school level during the evaluation process that starts during mid March through the month of May.
- · Formal and informal parent meetings during their visit to the family resource center and other school areas.

· All of the data collected from the above instruments are summarized by the district Coordinator of Family Engagement and Parental Engagement Liaisons. The data is reported to parents via a Data Analysis Report; it is distributed during the FET and Title I committee meetings for discussion and input. These discussions are on-going since the Title I committee meetings are scheduled monthly with educators and parents. The District FET meetings are held bi-monthly. This process will ensure the annual evaluation and review of the content and effectiveness of the Title I Parental Involvement program. This process will also include an assessment of what barriers to parental participation we still need to overcome. Based on the review and evaluation reports the Title I team with the input of parents will revise its Parental Involvement Plan and update it.
