






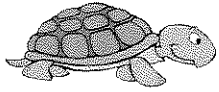

- Parent Academy update: the next Parent Academy will be April 27 and will focus on online learning.

New Business:

- District Parent Involvement Plan: Ms. Harper presented the tentative District Parent Involvement Plan and asked those present to review and suggest possible changes or improvements.
- Tuttle Parental Involvement Plan: Mr. Dinverno presented Tuttle's Parent Involvement Plan and asked members to suggest possible changes or improvements. A copy is attached to these minutes. Mr. Dinverno will collect feedback and present findings at the next meeting.
- Parent-Teacher-Student Compact: Mr. Dinverno presented proposed Parent-Teacher-Student-Compact and asked for input. A copy is attached. Mr. Dinverno will collect feedback and present at the next SAC meeting.
- Police contract: Mr. Dinverno has used internal funds to hire a police officer to monitor dismissal one or two times or week. Police presence assists with illegal parking, jaywalking, children not wearing seatbelts or out of child seats, monitoring traffic entering and leaving Tuttle, and suspicious behavior. Internal funds can finance an officer 3 more times, and Mr. Dinverno requested \$800 to continue police presence until the end of the year. The request was approved.

This website includes a calendar of upcoming events, important school information, and also provides numerous resources and links for parents to utilize to supplement their children's education.

Parent Information Center - Located in Tuttle's Main Office Lobby, parents will find a Parent Information Center. The Parent Information Center informs parents of upcoming events, pertinent school information, and information about community events and organizations.

Student Run Bookstore - Tuttle Elementary's Student Run Book Store is open two days a week before school to provide students and families and opportunity to purchase books well below market price (\$1.50 each book).

Reading Logs and Celebration - Each extended break, families are invited to complete a reading log. In addition to the reading log, families are provided with activity suggestions to prevent academic regression. Upon the completion of the reading log, students are invited to a celebration to celebrate their reading accomplishments.

Parent Outreach Coordinator - An ESOL Paraprofessional has part of her day allocated

to parent outreach efforts. The intent of this scheduled time is to encourage and support parents in more fully participating in the education of their children.
