Response: The Lake Wales Charter Schools will use each school's School Advisory Council (SAC) as the LEA parent group that will develop the LEA Parent Involvement Policy (PIP) in cooperation with LWCS Leadership Team members. (Every school in the LWCS system is a Title I school.) These groups will be responsible for evaluating and implementing the PIP. LWCS Leadership Team will coordinate technical assistance and training needs.

School Advisory Council (SAC) Members are voted on by parents and staff to serve for one school year. PTO Memberships are available to all parents willing to serve in the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO). Each SAC represents the diversity of the school community it serves. All LWCS schools have active and diverse School Advisory Councils.

The LEA Parent Involvement Policy will be submitted to each SAC to provide review, feedback and evaluation. SAC Members will be given a copy of the PIP draft to review and write their comments and return their copies to the schools' for final review and revisions. Information from the feedback/evaluation process will be used to update the plans annually.

Facilitators are given notification of all Monthly Title I Facilitator Meetings at first meeting scheduled in August. Reminder emails are sent to facilitators at least one week in advance. Documentation of the monthly meetings along with agendas, and sign in sheets are filed for audit compliance purposes.
