

We further pledge to coordinate and build capacity for increased parent participation through enriching and engaging activities whereby parents can exhibit effective parenting skills that will provide stabilization in the home and ultimately improve the academic achievement of our students.

The Local Educational Agency (LEA) has developed the District's Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council (EPAC), which is comprised of parents from various Title I schools. Elections for the EPAC are held every two years during the spring. Parent volunteers are nominated to serve as Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council officers and members. Elections are held by nominations of candidates. The Council consists of a mínimum of 15 voting members; with representation of parents from the north to the south sectors of the county; at least two community stakeholders; one Title I Staff member and an alternate Title I Staff member. The Council provides input into the development, implementation and evaluation of all district related plans, including but not limited to the District Improvement and Assistance Plan (DIAP), the LEA District's Parent Involvement Plan (PIP), the Title I, Part A application, and use of the set-aside allocation. The Broward LEA will present all projected district activities and expenditures for the upcoming school year to the district's Title I Executive Parent Advisory Council (EPAC) (notice of meetings dates will be mailed to council members). During the Title I EPAC meetings (September, December, March, May, and any call meetings that must be held to reach an agreeable consensus by the Council) members will review, provide recommendations and modifications regarding the projected parent involvement expenditures/activities and district parent involvement plan. The LEA and the Title I EPAC members are expected to reach consensus regarding the parent involvement expenditures and activities.

All schools receive training and information on ways to include parents in the school improvement process, school-level parental involvement plan, school-parent compact, and the activities of the school through the Title I Principals' Training and the Title I Liaisons' Technical Assistance Training.

The Division of Talent Development provides professional development for the School Advisory Council (SAC) personnel at each school site. Training includes gaining a thorough understanding of the School Improvement Plan (SIP) template and process for developing a plan, writing an agenda and conducting a SAC meeting, ways to build strong team membership and increase team commitment to and involvement in the SIP, and strategies for monitoring the SIP goals/objectives on an ongoing basis. These trainings are open to all parents who are participants in the school improvement process;

Parents/Guardians are invited and encouraged to become active members of the SAC and provide input in the development and decision-making process of all plans related to school improvement. Surveys are distributed to stakeholders and the results are then analyzed to evaluate the school needs. Data collected throughout the year is shared with each SAC. The results are utilized to plan effective parental involvement activities for the new school term.

Decisions involving the use of the one percent of Title I funds reserved for parental involvement will be made during the development of the SIP by the SACs at the Title I schools. Parents of students in Title I schools are involved at their individual school's Council. Of the one percent, not less than 95% will be allocated to schools. Parents will participate in the development of the school's Title I budget through participation in the school's SAC meetings. The parent involvement activities will be developed with the input (recommendations and/or suggestions) of the parents. The LEA will monitor SAC membership to ensure that parents are represented and involved in the process.

The LEA will conduct the following activities using the parent involvement set-aside to build the capacity for increased parental involvement as outlined in our Parental Involvement Plan:

- 1) Conduct an Annual Public Meeting (September 24, 2015);
- 2) Provide monthly Title I Parent Training Academy meetings that focus on literacy, academic instruction in the areas of reading, writing, math, science, college/career readiness, and health/wellness;
- 3) Training and support to the Title I schools (Title I Liaisons and Community Liaisons technical assistance meetings and support visits) on how to effectively increase parental participation at the school-level;
- 4) Parent Literacy training (train-the-trainer model) offered to school personnel and parents. This training will allow parents to engage with other parents as they acquire parent literacy skills that help build success for children, parents and teachers through books, trainings and partnerships with schools and communities;
- 5) Utilization of Parent Involvement staff to provide scheduled visitations by way of two mobile units (Parent Center on Wheels); Title I schools and Community Partners request the units to increase parent engagement at schools' literacy nights, academic fairs and

health fairs/community events in which Title I, ELL (English Language Learners), Head Start, and Homeless parents can borrow educational materials and receive information regarding events and services provided within the county;

- 6) Title I Parent Involvement Resource Center, which offers a welcoming atmosphere for parents, provides free educational resources and take-home materials. The materials are appropriate for grade levels Pre-K through 12;
- 7) Computer literacy training will also be provided through our Title I Parent Involvement Resource Center;
- 8) Coordinating an annual Parent Seminar with other federally funded grant programs, parents will attend academic concurrent sessions to improve literacy skills and school/community involvement. During this event parents will also receive valuable resources from community partners;
- 9) Partnership with the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition to institute the "Men-That-Care" and "Me and My Dad Challenge" initiative which actively employs male involvement with the mission to strengthen and provide training sessions for increased male participation;
- 10) Purchase current research-based instructional materials (for parent trainings, technical assistance training to schools, Parent Involvement Resource Center and mobile units).
- 11) Provide transportation for Title I parents to participate in district sponsored parent involvement events/activities.
- 12) Institute a summer learning initiative using the Title I mobile units, whereby the units will partner with various community camps to provide technology learning stations to Title I students.
- 13) Collaborate with the Urban League of Broward County, FL to launch the Community of Hope "The Parent Dream Team Project." This project's goal is to strengthen parent involvement by providing a support system of parent leaders that serve as facilitators and mentors to other parents.
- 14) Partnership with the Broward Health Community Health Services to provide health awareness and information as it relates to the well-being of the families we serve.
- 2. a. Orientation and technical assistance meetings are provided to new principals and Title I Liaisons of all Title I schools to assist in the development, implementation, review of all required plans, and ensure that schools are knowledgeable of their expectant roles and responsibilities.

Quarterly Title I Liaisons technical assistance meetings serve as the main forum for sharing information regarding the federal requirements of the district as a recipient of Title I, Part A funds. The Program Specialists are responsible for providing the information and technical assistance to schools. Additional, there is daily two-way communication via an email system (CAB Conference) for Title I Liaisons to address concerns and/or inquiries as it relates to Title I processes/procedures.

The LEA reviews each school-level parent involvement plan, school-parent compact, and annual parent survey results to ensure compliance and that the activities planned will provide meaningful opportunities for parents to become more involved in their child's education. This review process is conducted during July and feedback is provided to the schools by August (by way of the FDOE Parent Involvement Online Submission Evaluation and School Improvement Plan Committee feedback sessions). Schools begin developing and administering the documents during the months of March through May. The Parent Involvement Specialist is responsible for monitoring the completion of the school-level PIP, compact and annual evaluation. Program Specialists assigned to various innovation zone schools are responsible for monitoring SAC/SAF/PTSA/Parent Workshop flyers, agendas and minutes that provide evidence that parents are included in the decision-making process.

Parent Literacy Workshops will be provided by the LEA as another reasonable support for parental involvement activities. The Facilitators will provide train-the-trainer opportunities for Title I Liaisons, parent representatives, and other school staff to enhance their abilities to present parental involvement information and promote parent literacy. These trainings will be conducted in October by the assigned Program Specialists and Title I Community Liaisons.

Early Childhood Department (Head Start)	The LEA will coordinate services through the Early Childhood Department (Head Start). Title I, part A funds will be utilized to support one 3-4 year and two 4-year old early childhood classrooms by providing instructional positions, research-based curriculum and resources to assist students in the emergent stages of learning transition successfully to primary education. Title I, Part A funds will be used to provide professional development activities to meet the specific needs of teachers. These funds will also be used to increase parental involvement and provide educational workshops for parents to assist their child(ren) at home. In addition, Title I, Part A and Head Start in conjuction with the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition will coordinate the Men-That-Care initiative to provide fathers, male guardians and mentors viable resources for increased engagement.

Mrs. Snyder greeted the members.

Reports of Officers

Mrs. Howard gave an update on the media center for Broward Estates. Broward Estates Elementary School does have a media center but no media specialist. They had a mold problem in the media center and when it was renovated the books were replaced with new books. The books that have been collected by members of the Title 1 board will be given to the teachers in this school for their classrooms. Mrs. Lassalle suggested that Bennett Elementary could also use some additional books for their library.

Mrs. Snyder suggested that additional workshops could be given for Parent Engagement. These workshops would be on Saturdays at a centrally located conference room. Suggestions were given for Dunkin Donuts and Art Serve. These workshops could address the grading system of the public schools (not the students) so parents would come to understand what an "F" grade for a school really means.

Mrs. Howard mentioned that the South Training Academy might be moved from Attucks to Boulevard Heights Elementary to get more parents involvement. Mrs. Markos made a motion for this change. Mrs. Glover seconded. The motion passed.

Mrs. Markos suggested that Sawgrass Elementary could host a Parent Training Academy in the future as well.

Mrs. Markos brought up the bill put forth by a senator that Title 1 dollars follow the impoverished child instead of the school allocation. She wants to create an email with information about who to contact about the individualizing funds bill. She wants to educate herself how Title 1 funds are utilized. Mrs. Snyder stated she has witnessed individual schools holding Title 1 events and advertising them as Title 1 events, thus increasing Title 1 awareness.

It was discussed that Title 1 may be able to help to remove the stigma of Free and Reduced Lunch. The Title 1 mobile unit may help people to sign up for Free and Reduced Lunch. The Food & Nutrition Administration also has a mobile unit that goes to certain schools over the summer to help parents sign up for Free and Reduced Lunch.

Mrs. Howard stated that Mrs. Hines suggested that we, the board, attend a class on parliamentarianism given by the District Advisory Council (DAC). Mrs. Snyder stated that we would have to adopt the Robert Rules of Order as a group before we implement them. Mrs. Markos is now a DAC representative. Mrs. Howard will see if a workshop is available.
