Response: The mission of the Hendry County School District is to provide all students the opportunity to achieve at high academic levels, equipping them to successfully pursue college or career goals. Response: The District will establish a district-wide Parental Advisory Council (PAC) in order to create and evaluate the parental involvement plan in an ongoing manner. This council will be selected from the school-wide council rosters, and will be representative of Title I schools in the LEA. This council will be responsible for assisting the district in the creation and update of the LEA-wide parental involvement plan, and will provide input on how the funds reserved for parental involvement will be spent. This parent input will be documented through agendas and minutes kept at each meeting. In addition to the district wide committee, each school will submit a roster for a school-wide parental involvement committee that will be made up of school personnel and parents, who will participate in reviewing the schools' improvement plans.
