Response: The LEA has a District Parent Advisory Council that receives the input of parents in Title I schools. This council is composed of parents and individuals who reside in the Title I attendance area. This council provides input into the development, implementation and evaluation of school-related plans, (LEA Parental Involvement Plan, and use of funds). In an effort to strengthen dedicated school parent volunteers for effective parent engagement, the LEA will conduct Professional Development Training for families and school staff. Participants will gain a comprehensive understanding of the parent involvement plan, the process for developing and implementing the plan. The training will also include strategies for monitoring the school improvement goals and objectives which includes parent involvement.
