APTT (Academic Parent Teacher Teams) 2016-17 Empowering Families

As parents we want our children to be successful. We also want to be involved in the formal education of our children. Sometimes, however, many families don't know where to start, when to find the time, or how to go about making meaningful connections with the school.

Taylor County Schools are excited to kick off the fourth year of APTT---partnering with families to enable all children to succeed. In an effort to increase family engagement, raise test scores, and equip parents with the necessary tools to help their children academically, the Taylor County K-5 schools are working together to implement an innovative way of parent conferencing through the Academic Parent Teacher Team (APTT) model.

The traditional parent-teacher conference is being replaced by the APTT model which consists of three group meetings throughout the year, where teachers meet with all parents in their classroom. Each parent is provided with a folder of their child's performance indicators. Teachers then provide an in-depth coaching session on how to interpret this data based on overall classroom performance, school benchmarks, and state standards. Parents are provided with strategies and tools to help support learning at home. While working together, parents and teachers set goals for their students both individually and as a class.

Research has proven that when parents and schools work together, children are more successful. As a school system, we need to educate parents on ways to help their children. APTT is a positive way for teachers and parents to work together and enhances communication between the two stakeholders. It also provides parents with the knowledge needed for helping their child become the best student they can possibly be. All Taylor County parents are encouraged to attend their child's school on the following designated APTT nights:
