School Goals

The 2018-19 FSAA results were as follows: 62.5% (15 of 24) of the high school students scored Level 2 and above for ELA, and 70.6% (24 of 34) of these students scored Level 2 and above for Mathematics. Our goal is to implement monthly progress monitoring assessments during the school year which yield student growth. By the end of 2019-20, it is expected that there will be a 5% increase over the 2018-2019's results in Reading and Math for students taking the FSAA.

The goal is to have 90% of our students taking the FSAA ELA to score a Level 2 and above to meet our goal (.i.e. 23 out of 25). Based upon the mid-year data analysis, -60% of all students that had comparable BOY scores for FSAA ELA have shown at least 5% points improvement in their MOY scores over BOY scores.

By the end of school year 2020, the goal is to have 74% of our students taking the FSAA Math to score a Level 2 and above to meet our goal (i.e. 18 out of 24). Based upon the mid-year data analysis, 60% of all students that had comparable

Middle School Classroom

The High School Team will work with students and their families to support student success in reading and math. Some of our key connections with families will be:

- Send home learning materials in math, reading, and science
- Incorporate iReady in reading and math as a diagnostic and intervention tool for our highest students.
- Read daily with/to my students and discuss story using "WH" questions
- Provide opportunities for students to practice functional math skills throughout the school day
- Implement interventions for students who need help in reading and math
- Provide work that is relevant, functional, and interesting for students
- Provide an opportunity for reading practice in the Reading Club

At Home
