At the Report Card conferences in Oct./Nov. 2020 and April 2020, teachers will communicate the progress of the child in each curriculum area. Teachers will send home bi-weekly newsletters to keep parents informed. Sun 'n Lake sends home a bi-monthly newsletter in English and in Spanish if needed. A Home/School Communication Folder organizes the sharing of information between home and school. School event flyers are sent home in English and Spanish. Parents receive notifications for events via the Sun 'n Lake newsletter, Remind 101 text, call out and Facebook.

The FSA assessments and the school grades were suspended due to COVID-19 for the 2019-2020 school year.

Parent input, visits to school, phone calls, and emails are encouraged by administration and teachers. Coverage is provided so that teachers can meet with parents during the school day if needed.

All Title 1 correspondence will be housed in the Title 1 notebook for review if parents wish to review materials. The Assistant Principal will be in charge of the Title 1 notebook and will monitor that the information is provided.

The school uses social media such as Facebook as an effective tool to promote events at the school, communicate, and answer questions from parents and the community.

Translators for less prevalent languages are available, as needed, through the District Office. The School Social Worker and the Migrant Liaison will assist in making home visits and in transporting parents to school as needed.
