The Cutting Edge, parent volunteer program: A system has been established to work with interested parents from their homes who would like to support the faculty by cutting out school items at home and then returning them to the teachers. Family participation and comments will be used as documentation. This is on-going and headed by our FSL.

- 2. Helping Hands: A parent volunteer program has been developed to help train interested parents to work in the class room and assist the faculty. Family sign-in sheets, parent comments, teacher comments will be used as documentation. This is on-going and headed by the FSL.
- 3. The FPES Family_Resource Center maintains a large quantity and variety of activities and resources for parents to check out and use at home to support their child's learning. "Prescription Pads" for specific academic needs are available for teachers to complete and give to their student's parents.
- 4. FPES is able to provide our economically disadvantaged families with "Food Backpacks" each Friday to provide better nutrition for students while that are not a school. This service is supported by the FPES community.
- 5. FPES will hold our annual Family Dance which will be sponsored by the PTO. Our goal is to provide another avenue to establish strong bonds between the student, the student's family and the school.

Spanish translators are available at the school to provide translation services whenever needed during the school day.

Fruitland Park Elementary school has scheduled family meetings throughout the year to provide curricular and FSA information to our students' parents. Additionally, the school's website provides links to the Florida Department of Education website for additional information on curriculum, parent resource and testing information. Curriculum and testing will be addressed at the Annual Title 1 Parent meetings. Parents are also encouraged to meet with our faculty and CRT individually to answer specific curricular and testing questions.

The schools SAC meetings are also posted on the school web site and school marquee to invite interested family to the meetings.

PTO meetings are posted on the website and are a part of messages sent through our school messenger call out system.

Response: In an effort to make Fruitland Park Elementary as accessible to families as possible, the school will provide Spanish translators, child care and dinner at family meetings. The school will also offer a Title 1 family meeting in the evening and in the morning during the fall in an effort to reach out to those families who are unable to attend evening meetings. BRIDGE activities will be timed flexibly to accommodate morning and evening availability. Announcements of school meetings are advertised in a number of ways to reach the widest audience possible including but not limited to the school marquee, the school web site, school messenger system and parent notices to the parents in the students Parent/Teacher file which goes home each day. Family notices will be timely. These notices are translated into Spanish for our Spanish speaking families. The parent meeting minutes (SAC / PTO and Title 1) will be posted on the school's website. For those parents who do not have access to the internet, computers and assistance are available to them in the Family Resource area. Additionally, the family resource center is open to families to borrow materials to work with their children at home. The Family Resource Center offers early morning and evening hours to better accommodate the busy schedule of many of our families. Parents with disabilities may receive accommodations based on their needs. Families are supported and informed on an individual basis. School leadership will seek district support for needs that require more than what's available at the school level.
