STEM Night	53	77% of families felt that the event was well publicized. Over 84% of families said that the event was well organized, the content delivery was clear and informative, and that the activities were things that they can do at home.	Send invitations out sooner giving even more families a chance to plan to attend. A table flow for families to have an organized way to hit all activities. Make sure that volunteers have time to review their station so they they can be prepared to share information about the content. Make sure to incorporate make and take activities that families can continue to use at home as a resource. We can also create a hand out to parents that they can keep at home as a resource with different activities that they can do at home to extend the learning. As a team, we met to discuss some other reflections from the STEM Night. It appeared to be a smaller crowd than we had at our last parent night so we analyzed the day. STEM Night was held on Tuesday night, which is different from our last event that was held on Thursday night. This showed us that Tuesday may not be the best night for family events at school due to conflicting schedule.	Parents were able to learn about different types of hands on activities that they could do with their children at home to focus on Science and Math. 92% of parents marked on the survey that they believe family involvement increases student achievement. By students seeing the connection between home and school, parent and teacher, student achievement will increase in all subject areas.

Have traffic maps to decrease flow of traffic in hallways and common areas.	The event showed the children that they have a fun school. It also gave families the opportunity to come together and meet other families. Families learned games they can use at home to support student achievement in the classroom. By parents playing these academic games at home with their children, it will help them to learn the content and increase their achievement in the classroom.

Literacy Night	30	Overall, the vast majority of parents gave the event positive ratings and included positive feedback in the comment session. Most parents felt the Test Taking Strategies were helpful and they enjoyed having make and take activities to use with their children at home.	Next time try a later start time to accommodate working parents. We had a slow start and more parents started to arrive around 6:00pm. Several parents requested that we offer grade level specific activities rather than having topics open to multiple grades. Include a map of the school along with welcome materials for easier transitions. Have all materials (handouts, agendas, parent surveys) translated into Spanish instead of just having a translator to assist. Limit parent events to 1 per week. One parent mentioned that due to our Ice Cream Social the night before, they almost didn't make it.	As a result of the training parents were able to work on reading strategies at home with their children. They were able to help review test taking strategies as well. This will help to increase student achievement in Reading and on Reading assessments.

As a result of this training, staff learned effective strategies to communicate with parents in regard to their student's behavior. This training outlined a tool to keep parent communication open and increase family engagement.

All participants strongly agreed that the strategies that were presented in the PD will be easy to implement.	The only recommendation noted was to change the parent pre-conference form to include the question" How does my child perform compared to to grade level standards?" One participant requested a sample of a completed conference form to use as a guide to complete her own.	As a result, teachers were able to learn strategies to build positive relationships with students and parents through parent conferences. By making a parent conference an enjoyable experience for all involved, family engagement will increase.

The English as a Second Oral Language (ESOL) teacher at Cypress Trails Elementary School will provide families with resources to use at home. The Community Language Facilitators (CLF) will be available to translate both written and oral communication in Spanish with families as needed. If other languages are needed, staff can request additional translators or utilize a resource called Language Line to use over the phone.

#### Accommodations for parents and families with disabilities (i.e. Hearing or vision impairment, physical limitations)

Cypress Trails Elementary School utilizes the support of the district resource staff to provide accommodations for parents and families with disabilities as needed. The entire school campus is accessible for those with a physical disability that requires the use of a device for mobility or those that might be visually impaired.

### Accommodations for families engaged in migratory work

Cypress Trails Elementary School will work together with the school district to support families engaged in migratory work if families in that situation register at the school. The school will request for the migrant list and then work closely with the district migrant contact for appropriate services for targeted students. School Counselor will provide home visits for these families. Staff will be instructed on how to make referrals to the Migrant Department.

### Accommodations for families experiencing homelessness

Cypress Trails Elementary School upholds the McKinney-Vento Act with fidelity and staff works closely with the Safe School Department and the liaison to support families experiencing a hardship. The school will request the list of students affected by homelessness and will work with the McKinney-Vento District contact for appropriate support and services. School Counselor will provide home visits for these families. Letters will be sent home with these students for parent assistance and communication. Transportation will be arranged through the district for students experiencing homelessness to attend school. Referral form 2479 will be used to document with the district.
