Response:

A School Advisory Council will be established to actively involve parents in planning, reviewing, and improving the Title I program at Wauchula Elementary School. Ballots will be disseminated to the parents to vote for those whom they want to represent them on the council. The committee will be ethnically representative of the population served by Wauchula Elementary School. The committee will meet quarterly, at a minimum, to provide input on all aspects of the Title I program, including the School Improvement Plan, Parent Involvement Plan, and how parent involvement funds are used. School Advisory Council meetings are open to nonmembers as well.
