In addition, notification of upcoming meetings will be sent home with students and followed up with an automatic calling system notifying parents of upcoming meetings. Membership enrollment will be ongoing throughout the school year and members will be selected from the turnout of interested parents and staff members. Monthly meeting agenda topics will include, but are not limited to school improvement, and topics which are recommended and required in accordance with Title I parent involvement committees. The Title I Facilitator and School Based Leadership Support Team will be responsible for the implementation of this task. The Title I committee is made up of staff and parents who receive updates on all aspects of the school wide Title I programs at Moton Elementary School. At the first Title I Committee meeting a schedule was determined by stakeholders in attendance and set for the year. These meetings will occur at least six times throughout the year. Additional parent trainings and workshops will be offered by grade level no more than once a quarter. These trainings will be held at a convenient time for parents and offer modeling of methods for parents to assist in completion of homework and offer support in the current academic curriculum. Workshops will demonstrate knowledge of the various forms of required assessments at each grade level, and the proficiency level expectations of their child in comparison with their peers. Parents may obtain information on a student's academic achievement upon request at the school. School grade information may be found on the school, district, and Florida Department of Education websites. Additional topics will be determined from suggestions offered by parents appropriate to the needs of their children. Parent conferences will be scheduled with individual teachers and all data will be available for discussion at such conferences. Data will be provided in accordance with the requirements of the school, district, and state. Parents will be notified of events through such means as mail, sticky labels in student agenda, automatic calling system, school marquee, invitations, school website, and parent phone calls.
