Response: The School Advisory Committee of Fort White Elementary is the group responsible for the planning, review, and improvement of the Title I program. At the beginning of each year, parent volunteers are recruited to serve on our School Advisory Council (SAC Committee) through fliers sent home with students, information presented at our Meet the Teacher and Open House, and through our website. Parent volunteer names are then combined with names of staff and community leaders to form our SAC Council, which will meet a minimum of 4 times during the school year. Discussion of the School Improvement Plan, Parent Involvement Plan, and Title I funds, including parent involvement and professional development funds, will take place during these monthly meetings, and will be documented by use of agendas, minutes,

and sign in sheets. In addition to information received from parents during the SAC meetings, parent input is received through surveys sent home to every parent each year.

Fort White Elementary will provide parents with many opportunities to receive information and become an active participant in their child's education. Some of these opportunities include Meet the Teacher Day, Open House night, Title I Annual Meeting, Parent-Teacher Conferences, Parent Workshops, SAC & PTO meetings, and information sent home in fliers, newsletters, and provided on the website. We also conduct multiple Volunteer Orientation opportunities, which encourages parents to be involved in their child's education. Response: One of the barriers we must overcome is that of parents working 20-30 miles from our community, rendering them unavailable for daytime conferences and contributing to the difficulty in making evening parent workshops. Evening meetings have a history of poor participation unless a meal or childcare is offered. For example, when meals or childcare is not offered, 10% of our parents attended a nighttime activity. When meals or childcare was offered, more than 30% of our parents attended a nighttime activity.

Family Reading Night- the Media Center is open bi-monthly to provide parents the opportunity to read with their child. Students may take AR quizzes.

Parent Resource Room available to provide material such as computer software, reading & math games, science activities, and academic review material for parents to checkout for home use. Parent Resource Room will be open each school day and will be open at least one Family Reading Night per month.

Response: At the beginning of the year, parents are invited to an Open House. During this meeting, parents are provided information about Fort White Elementary, how to schedule parent-teacher conferences, and invited to participate in the School Advisory Council in order to be involved in decisions related to the education of their child. Teachers also provide information about the Florida State Standards, the subjects taught, assessments, student proficiency levels, and how parents can help at home.

At the Annual Title I Parent Meeting, information will be provided to the parents about the Title I programs, the curriculum, and academic assessments. Sign-in sheets for the meetings will be maintained in the Curriculum Resource Teacher's office. Information about the Title I programs are distributed through a Title I Summary and a Title I brochure, both sent home with students at the beginning of the year and with every new student throughout the year, and this information is also available on the school website and in the front office.

A Child-Teacher-Parent Compact is discussed and signed during a parent teacher conference held during the end of the first nine weeks. The Parent Compact is reviewed and modified on a yearly basis by our District Parent Involvement committee. The compact is used during the course of the year at parent conferences, documenting student progress in math and reading, student goals, conferences and any other meaningful information.

Student progress is monitored through progress reports, which are sent home every 4.5 weeks, at a minimum. Various information provided in school newsletters, teacher notes, district curriculum grade level expectations, parent flyers, and student data reports are sent home quarterly to inform parents of student progress. Student progress is also monitored through district-wide progress monitoring tools, such as STAR, with progress monitoring reports sent home three times per year. School and district websites offer information to parents concerning state assessments, parent trainings, in addition to providing resources for parents wanting to assist their children at home.

The Curriculum Resource Teacher maintains an activity log documenting activities which includes dates, times, day of week, number in attendance, who organized event, and what was used as an evaluation.

Recorded phone calls made to student homes using the School Messenger website utilizes primary language information provided by the parents to provide families with information about upcoming events in either English or Spanish. Parent conferences and meetings will be translated as needed. The Parent Involvement Plan will be posted on Fort White Elementary's website. If needed, American Sign Language and Braille translations can be provided for those families who would benefit from the services.

Parent involvement opportunities will take place both during and after school to encourage participation by as many families as possible. Activities will be advertised on the school marquee, in the local newspaper, posted in local businesses, through flyers sent home with students and through the School Messenger phone system. A monthly newsletter will go home with all students, listing opportunities for parent involvement, as well as activities occurring on campus. Parents are also encouraged to utilize the school website where activities and parent resources are available. School planners or agendas will also be used to keep parents informed of activities and promote home - school communication.
