Teachers may also request a conference by contacting parents through a letter, e-mail, or phone call. Evidence of these conferences is maintained in the teacher's Parent Communication Log. Written communication will be provided in the parent's home language, English or Spanish. Translators will be available to assist parents with conferences or written communications.
