We foster a positive school climate, which respects and values diversity and nurtures everyone's self-esteem. Response: Joyce Bullock Elementary School involves parents, teachers, and community members in the planning and reviewing of the Title One program. The members of the SAC are comprised of lead teachers, voluntary community members, and parents from a diverse range of ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds. We strive to have more than 50% of our SAC members be non-employee representatives. Parents from each class are sent requests to join the SAC and special invitations are sent to those that teachers feel would be more willing to donate their time to the school. The SAC meets six times a year, with review of the Title One programs at least 4 times a year. Parents who are not able to attend the meeting are notified of the opportunity to submit their input in Skyward email announcements, phone home messages, and school newsletter. Parents who wish to attend District Advisory Council meetings and have transportation or childcare concerns will have childcare provided and travel reimbursed as necessary to ensure their participation. Parent surveys are reviewed annually by the SAC and changes to the program are made based on survey results. All SAC meeting agendas and minutes are used as documentation, as well as copies of all paper notification sent home to parents.

Response: Joyce Bullock Elementary School has worked with its parents to find a time most convenient for parents to attend meetings and increase parent involvement in the school. Monthly SAC meetings will be held the second Tuesday of the month at 6 p.m.,

as decided by SAC members at the first meeting. These monthly meetings focus on the school budget and how it is spent, the learning progress of students and things we can do to further succeed, and completing documents that support our school as a Title One school. Due to parents having multiple children in different grade levels, we will offer our annual meeting at different times. Our annual meeting, on August 27 at staggered times by grade level, will cover required topics for parents to know as being part of a Title One school, as well as RtI/MTSS, Free Breakfast/Lunch, and the Florida Standards. This information is also provided the following day at 9 a.m.

Family Nights will be held at school at different dates and/or times to allow the most parents to participate based on their schedule. Family nights will focus on ways parents can best help their child at home. Two flexible meetings, one in the morning and one in the evening, will be held in September to inform parents of how to use i-Ready so they can best help them at home and to teach parents about how to use Skyward to access their child's school information for attendance, discipline, and academics. Parent conferences with teachers and RtI meetings will be held at the parents' convenience and worked around their schedule. One late evening until 7:30 is also offered in the fall and the spring. Parent participation in all meetings and events is vital therefore suggestions of alternative times, days, and methods to holding meetings will be taken under advisement and shared with the school advisory team and staff. All material covered at parent nights and at the annual title one meeting will be backpacked home to all those who did not attend.
