Response: Redland Elementary School believes in involving parents in all aspects of its Title I programs. At the May 2015

EESAC Meeting, the assistant principal reviewed the 2014-2015 School Improvement Plan (SIP) and Parent Involvement Plan (PIP) and gathered feedback in order to create the 2015-2016 SIP and PIP. In addition, all parents were given the opportunity to review the PIP and offer their input prior to approval. For the PIP all parents were given surveys at the beginning of the 2015-2016 school year seeking their input on activities, training, and materials they need to help their child. The SIP and PIP drafts will be reviewed at the October 2015 EESAC meeting. The Title I budget was presented with input from parents. A decision on how to spend the Title I funds was discussed. The EESAC committee, which meets quarterly, or as necessary, will review any information that would be put into practice.

At the annual meeting of parents in August, Redland Elementary School will hold a general meeting where information will be presented about the Title I programs, the curriculum, and academic assessments. Parents will learn about the schoolwide program, how to schedule parent-teacher conferences, how to access the parent portal, and opportunities for participation in decisions related to the education of their child. Upon conclusion of the general meeting, parents will be invited to visit their child's classrooms and meet staff. During the classroom visits, teachers will provide additional information on the subjects they teach, assessment plans, and how parents can help at home.
