Response: The Principal's parent nominations from each school will be used to recruit no fewer than ten parents to serve on the Title I District Parent Advisory Committee (DPAC). These parents along with the Title I Parent Education Facilitation team meet to develop, implement and evaluate the Parent Involvement Plan (PIP). Each section of the PIP is reviewed by the DPAC. Documentation of parent input is recorded in meeting minutes and is used in the development of the PIP. The DPAC representatives act as a liaison between the DPAC committee and the Title I school community.

The availability of the PIP is advertised to parents through schools' marquees, newsletters, and telephone messages sent to all parents. The LEA offers consultation to schools as they develop and implement their plan and activities through technical assistance, survey data and personal contact. Each school's PIP is posted on the Title I website. The LEA notifies parents about the "Parents Right to Know" requirement through the Title I Parent Handbook and the district website.

DPAC meetings will include discussion on how funds reserved for parental involvement will be spent. The funds reserved for parental involvement are used to provide a variety of activities or projects based on the needs of the schools. The LEA has allocated \$130,000.00 for district sponsored parent involvement activities. Parent Contact meetings serve as a main forum for sharing information.
