Response: The mission of the Columbia County School District's Title I program is to promote academic success for all students by creating opportunities and removing barriers for parents to become actively engaged in their child's education.

Response: The LEA promotes parent involvement as required in Title I Part A [Section 1118(a)(2)], [Section 1112 (c)(H)], and [Section 1112(d)(1)]. In order to meet these requirements a District Family and Community Involvement Council comprised of 55 members representing parents, teachers, administrators, private schools, and community representatives has been established. Schools place an open invitation for parents to join the District Family and Community Involvement Council and their School Advisory Council at Open House, the Annual Meetings, face to face, in newsletters, backpack, and on the web. From these names, two parent representatives from each school are elected to serve on the District Family and Community Involvement Council. All parents are encouraged to join together and communicate and provide input into the development of the District Five Year Plan, District Parent Involvement Policy, School Parent Involvement Policy and School Improvement Plan.

The District Family and Community Involvement Council meets a minimum of 4 times per year. The council provides input into the development, implementation and evaluation of all school related plans as required by LEA-wide parental involvement policy (PIP)[Section 1118(a)(2)],[Sections 1112 (c)(H), 1112(d)(1)]. Parents from the council volunteer to participate in one or more subgroups: Annual Meeting and Evaluation, School and District Parent Involvement Plan, Coordination and Integration of Strategies, and Building Capacity for Strong Parent Involvement. All parents are given the opportunity to review the District Parent Involvement Plan and offer input prior to approval. Attendance records and minutes are recorded to document the input from parents. Subgroups meet during the first and second semester. The subgroups report to the District Family and Community Involvement Council. When the council has approved the District Policy it is sent to the School Board and School Superintendent for review, approval, and adoption. The council is also involved in the review of the LEA's Five Year Plan.

The District Parent Involvement Plan is posted on the county website and copies are available in the County Parent Involvement Office. Schools post approved Parent Involvement Plans and School Improvement Plans on the web, copies are also available at meetings and upon request at the front office. Schools will hold several Parent Involvement Meetings throughout the year to accommodate parents schedule such as: different days of the week, times, childcare and serving food at meetings. All parents will receive a survey at the end of the school year seeking their input on activities, training and materials they need to help their child.

Decisions involving the use of Parent Involvement funds will be made during the development of the SIP by the School Advisory Council no later than the first nine weeks of school. Funds for parent involvement are usually spent on salaries and parent workshops to provide parents with the skills needed to support their children academically such as reading nights, math homework help, etc.

Response: The District Parent Involvement Contact provides technical assistance and other support to the Curriculum Resource Teachers at Title I schools. Meetings are scheduled monthly to discuss best practices and strategies related to parent involvement. Curriculum Resource Teachers return to the school to share information with faculty. Agendas, attendance records, and handouts are used for documentation.

School Improvement Plans will be developed at each school to incorporate parent involvement goals. This will be an ongoing process throughout the year.

Parents Right to Know information is printed in the back to school flyer supplement of the local newspaper, included in the first edition of school newsletters, on school websites, and/or in a parent brochures given out during the first nine weeks. Parents will also receive information during the first nine weeks of the school year on the interpretation and implementation of Parent Involvement Laws. Parents play an active role in the annual review of the school. Each parent is given the opportunity to complete an annual school survey.

Council members volunteer to serve on one or more subgroup: Annual meeting and Evaluation, School and District Parent Involvement Plan, Coordination and Integration of Parent Involvement strategies, Building School and Parent's Capacity for a stronger parent involvement. Sign in sheets and Minutes are recorded to document the input from parents. Subgroups meet the first and second semester. The subgroups report to Council members at regularly scheduled council meetings.

District Family and Community Involvement Council's Annual review and evaluation subgroup reviews the District plan and practices, and revises the PIP as needed based on the information from surveys, parent participation and face to face interviews. The school will have opportunities both during and after school to encourage parent involvement.
