Response: The LEA:

1)Employs a full-time Family Engagement Teacher On Assignment to support family engagement programming at the school and implement programming at the district level

2)Appoints an individual for each of the Title I schools to serve as the parent/family liaison. The parent/family liaison will attend monthly professional development sessions to ensure compliance in the implementation of the school-level family engagement program. This individual is also responsible for recruiting parents to serve on Team Seminole, the district parent advisory committee. The parent/family liaison works to ensure equal parent representation across grade levels, ethnic/racial backgrounds, socioeconomic statuses, disabilities, and languages.

Team Seminole meetings are held quarterly and are comprised of parent representatives and parent/family liaisons from each of the Title I schools. The purpose of the Team Seminole meetings is to provide parents an opportunity to give input into the planning, joint development, evaluation, periodic review, and improvement of the Title I LEA required policies, plans, and process of school review and improvement. Members of this team have direct input in the selection of LEA parent workshop/training offerings, locations, times, and parental involvement budget expenditures.

Response: The LEA Title I, ESOL, ESSS Department, school-based parent/family liaisons, and Families in Transition program have all partnered to develop and offer parent workshops, trainings, and parental engagement activities in the native languages of parents with children attending Title I Schools. Translation is provided when reasonable and necessary. Additionally, the LEA has access to the Community Involvement Language Bank program which is a cadre of bi-lingual volunteer community Dividends who are speakers of other languages and available to interpret or translate for parents upon request. Free child care and refreshments are provided for families attending school-based and LEA sponsored parent involvement activities. At the conclusion of all training sessions participants are offered an opportunity to evaluate the workshops as well as provide feedback regarding their training needs. Workshops are offered at school and community-based sites on mornings, afternoons, evenings, before and after schools, and on Saturdays.

LEA workshops are scheduled at various times, days, and locations to accommodate parents' work schedules.
