Our PTCO will also hold a book drive to collect books that will be given to parents and students that participate in our Reading Night. Guest parents/teachers will present suggestions on how they can help students with Reading activities. Other PTCO activities to include parents on campus include muffins with moms and doughnuts with dads. One each in the fall and spring semesters.

The Annual Title 1 meeting conducting with the breakout sessions are monitored through sign-in sheets that are provided to the Supervisor of Federal Programs for record keeping.

Parent conferences will be held twice each year and documented on a JC 246. School Advisory Council Meetings (4 times a year) are held with parents, community or business members, teachers, and administrators to coordinate the school's improvement plan and recommendations of how to reach these goals. Parent Involvement members also serve on the School Advisory Council therefore guiding and monitoring the direction of the school academic path. Minutes will be taken and sign-in sheets save for the School Advisory Council Meetings as well.
