Response: Students along with their parents will be invited to participate in a number of campus-wide events throughout the school year that promote literacy, science and math through academic celebrations and literacy nights. We recently introduced band and strings to our music department and conducted Winter and Spring concerts that parents were invited to attend. This year we hope to add piano to our musical repertoire to further build or students musical talent. Indian Pines Elementary home language. Parents are always given the opportunity to have a community language facilitator present during teacher conferences, School Based Team meetings, SAC, Open House Nights, and Individual Education Plan meetings. Our school has also established a student uniform closet to provide school uniforms for families in need of assistance.

Response: Parents are informed of student achievement through student agendas (teachers send agendas home daily with homework, behavior notes, and current grade information and parents can also send notes to the teacher in the agenda), Progress Reports (parents may request to have a progress report sent home on a daily or weekly basis), and Parent Teacher Conferences (conducted throughout the school year to share students' current assessment progress and academic standing). At this time parents are strongly encouraged to provide feedback and address any academic concerns they have with the teacher.

Indian Pines also utilizes Edline. Our Edline page has links to FSA testing and School Improvement Plan information, as well as provides monthly updates on academic focuses and assessments.

Parent Newsletters are sent home with quarterly to share each department and grade levels current activities. All communication is translated into Spanish and Creole.

Monthly newsletters, EDLINE updates, emails, call outs, and the marquee will be used to inform and invite parents of upcoming Title I program activities. SAC meetings will be open to the public monthly and parents are encouraged to attend as a means to participate in decisions relating to the education of their child. Parent comments and suggestions will be noted in meeting minutes.

Response: Indian Pines has three Community Language Facilitators (CLF) that support in Spanish, Creole, and multiple interpreters for Sign Language. All parents are given academic communication in English, Spanish, and Creole. We have an ESOL Guidance counselor that is available to facilitate parent teacher conferences and help with non-English speaking parent volunteers. Our Guidance and Administration make home visits with CLFs for those who are not able to provide their own transportation. We provide interpreted messages for the school wide telephone message announcement. We provide special seating arrangements for parents who need the accommodations at school events. Our school meets the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act in order to provide access to our school and classrooms.
