The Title I Annual Meeting and Back to School Night is held in the evening during the first nine weeks of school for parents to learn about Title I programs and requirements. The District Family Engagement Team (FET) meets on selected Wednesday mornings throughout the school year. Additionally, the Title I Facilitator is available for evening appointments to ensure parents can access resources after regular school hours.
