In the case of visually or hearing impaired students, speech classes and Braille curriculum's are available for the students in order for them to receive a quality education in a least restrictive environment. Speech and Occupational Therapy is provided to those who may require these services.

Vernon Middle School provides a variety of methods of sharing information with parents in order to disseminate the information that will assist them to be actively involved in their child's education.
