Open House is scheduled at the beginning of the year to invite parents in to meet the teachers. Report Card pick up days are designated during the school year to allow parents to have meaningful conversations with teachers about student performance. Parent / teacher conferences throughout the school year to track student progress.

Response: A Title 1 orientation meeting is held at the beginning of the year to provide information about the programs offered at the school.

Informational letters, monthly parent calendars, and Connect-Ed messages addressing information regarding Title I and its programs are communicated to parents in a timely manner in English, and Spanish.

Parents and children in grades K-5 will receive reports and updates of their children's progress on state and district assessments. Lake Stevens Elementary follows the curriculum supported by the District for all of the core subjects. Student progress is measured throughout the year using the I-Ready software for math and reading. Each year grades 3-5 are assessed by the state with the Florida Standards Assessment. Grades k-2 are assessed with the SAT-10 Assessment. Students are expected to make a proficiency level of 3 or higher on the Florida Standards Assessment and K-2 students are expected to make a stanine of 6 or higher to meet proficiency.

Parents of children who are performing below grade level are advised of their child's progress through performance monitoring plan meetings.

Parents are encouraged to meet with their children's teachers to discuss concerns regarding their achievement.
