Upon receiving returned surveys, a schedule will be made to determine times feasible for greatest participation. The school will work with he Parent Academy to schedule monthly meetings and/or parenting classes. During these meetings the Community Involvement Specialist (CIS) will be available to organize childcare services.

The parent resource center is open daily to guide parents in a variety of ways; the CIS offers computer assistance, allows for the parents to check out materials to use at home, gives community resources, and guides parents as they fill out applications.
