Response: Lake Butler Elementary School holds an open house per grade level in September of each school year where information is disseminated concerning Title I programs, curriculum, academic assessments and grade level information. Parents learn about the school wide program, how to schedule parent-teacher conferences, and opportunities for participation in decisions related to the education of their child. The parents receive information in a general meeting from the LBES principal then are invited to visit their child's classroom and meet the teacher. During the classroom visits, teachers will provide additional information on the subjects they teach, assessments plans, and how parents can help at home. The same information will be provided in an informational packet distributed the following day for all parents who are unable to attend. The LBES Office Staff will maintain sign in sheets. If a parent is unsatisfied with the school-wide program plan they will be asked to provide their comments to the LBES principal who will then forward the comment to the Title I Director.

All parents are also asked to meet with their child's teacher at the end of the first 9 weeks grading period to go over assessments, grades and progress. Any additional meetings are upon parent and/or teacher request. Parents are encouraged to set-up meetings if there are any concerns. These meetings are conducted with the teacher, guidance counselor and principal (upon request).
