Sweetwater Elementary School Title I Minutes September 14, 2016

The annual Title I Meeting for all Title I parents and other interested stakeholders was held on Wednesday, September 14, 2016. The meeting began at 5:40 p.m. in the Sweetwater Elementary covered patio area. The meeting was opened by Mrs. Janet Olivera, Principal and Mr. Morris Gil, Assistant Principal. They welcomed all stakeholders and thanked them for attending. The importance of parental involvement was stressed.

Mrs. Olivera stated that Sweetwater Elementary is a Title I school. She explained what the Title I program is and how it provides additional funding and services to the school. She continued by informing the parents that Sweetwater Elementary had received a grade of "C" from the State as the based on the results of the FSA examinations. She also overviewed the Florida Standards and provided an overview of the school wide instructional changes made to enhance student learning. Additionally, Ms. Olivera mentioned the importance of parental involvement as a key to student success.

Mr. Gil then presented information about the school's curriculum plan and tentative testing schedule. Information was also provided regarding the new AIRS assessment and what is tentatively known about the exam. He spoke about how supplemental support through Title I funds help with student achievement. Parents were encouraged to make suggestions about the utilization of these funds.

Mrs. Olivera introduced Maria Acosta, the Community Involvement Specialist. Mrs. Acosta explained her role and spoke about parental involvement. She encouraged all stakeholders to attend the Title I parent workshops and to visit the Title I Parent Outreach Center. She informed the parents that all activities would be listed in the school's calendar and flyers would be sent home with the students. The monthly Outreach meetings were presented and their topics were outlined. Furthermore, Ms. Acosta made it clear that she was readily available to assist parents with any concerns they may have and to act as a liaison between parents and the school site.

Ms. Acosta then spoke about the Parent-School Compact and Parental Involvement Plan. She explained that Title I schools and families work together and how the school's plan to achieve this may be found in the School's Parent Involvement Plan and the Parent —School Compact. Copies of the prior plan and compact were made available. Parents were informed that in addition to the copy which was being sent home, the final PIP documents are always available in the office and Parent Resource Center.

Ms. Olivera reviewed the current language of the Parent-School Compact in both English and Spanish. Parents were given the opportunity to review the current language of the compact and asked for their input on additions, deletions, or changes they wished to have made. One of the parents asked, "What do the reports on student progress looked like?" Ms. Olivera responded that formal progress reports were sent home quarterly and the dates of distribution are always on the monthly calendar that goes home with the students, and then at the end of the quarter report cards are sent home, and again notified on the calendar. Ms. Olivera also reminded parents that the parent portal account allows one to see their child's progress on a daily or weekly basis. She then asked if they accepted the language as is and the parents said, "yes."

This year, parents were invited to visit the variety of informational tables set up in the covered patio. Parents were encouraged to fill out the Title I survey to identify informational sessions of interest for parent meetings and return it to their child's teacher at the end of the meeting. Mrs. Olivera and Mr. Gil thanked the parents for their assistance and asked them to visit with their child's teacher. The Title I annual meeting came to a close at 6:25 pm.
