Response: Bronson Middle/High School teachers, guidance counselors, reading coach and administration work together closely to gather relevant and timely information for dissemination to parents about tutoring opportunities, parent workshops to discuss data and standards for graduation, meeting dates, and reading and math literacy resources. The Skyward message system is used to notify parents that data results have been

received or to send reminders about dates and deadlines as they approach throughout the year. The automated phone home system is used to invite parents to upcoming meetings and events throughout the year. The FaceBook page is a vehicle for communicating with all stakeholders publicly for monthly SAC meetings, and the school website is used to house handouts, flyers, a calendar of dates, and quarterly newsletter.

Additionally, teachers make phone calls home with concerns, mail postcard accolades, and meet with parents face-to-face to discuss individual student assessment data and ways for parents to be more involved in their child's education.
