FAIR is the progress monitoring tool used school-wide to provide data and plan for meaningful reading instruction for all students. This assessment accurately measures student achievement and aids in improving instruction in the classroom. The test measures student knowledge, identifies deficiencies, and allows the teacher to us the data to plan

remediation strategies. Math assessments are aligned with Florida Standards and evaluated in modules. Teachers will share this information with families during conferences and use results to drive and adjust instruction.

- *Mrs. Span, our school's Parent Involvement Para, is responsible for making copies of flyers, invitations, reminder labels for student agendas, adding the family engagement notice to the monthly newsletter, sending out reminder e-mails about upcoming events and SAC meetings.
