Response: In order to involve parents in the planning and implementation of the Title I programs and the school's parent involvement plan, parents were invited to an Orientation meeting held on September 9, 2015. During this meeting, parent interests and needs were assessed to determine the type of workshops and activities to be offered throughout the school year. Parents were also informed about and invited to visit the Parent Resource Center at the school to obtain information regarding available programs, their rights under No Child Left Behind, and other referral services.

Currently, there are parenting classes offered monthly to assist families with parenting skills and understanding child development. The classes also provide parents/guardians with ideas on how to create a home environment supportive of their child's education. For example, parents are informed on how they can assist their children during test taking by ensuring they get a good night's sleep and eat a healthy breakfast.

Parents are informed of ongoing activities and meeting dates through monthly flyers and/or letters and the use of ConnectEd messages. All communication goes home in the parents' home language: English, Spanish and Creole. Parents are also encouraged to volunteer and participate in ongoing activities. In order to facilitate participation meetings and activities are offered at flexible times, morning and/or afternoon to accommodate parent's work schedules and other commitments.
