This newsletter will also announce upcoming meetings and parent workshops. Each quarter parents will be provided with an explanation of their students current assessment data and reading placement and encouraged to set up a parent/teacher conference to review that data. In addition, the school web site is current and easily accessible. Grade levels also send home newsletter to keep parents informed about upcoming tests, meetings, activities, etc.
