She conducts home visits, provides parents referrals to community resources, attends monthly PAC meetings with parents, conducts parent trainings, greets parents in the morning, implements parent outreach for workshops and meetings, assists parents accessing on-line resources and offering a comprehensive Parent Resource Center within the school. The Parent Resource Center is full of valuable literature giving parents ideas on how to help their children. It houses materials for parents to check out and use at home with their child. There is also technology for parents who do not have computers at home. The Community Involvement Specialist assists parents to utilize these valuable resources.

Parents are shown where they can access the Parent Handbook on-line which includes more detailed information. Upon conclusion of the general meeting, parents are invited to visit their child's classroom and meet staff. During the classroom visits, teachers provide additional information on the subjects they teach, assessments, and how parents can help at home. All meetings are conducted in English and Spanish. Teachers maintain sign-in sheets for documentation of this event.
