Weeks later, at the 2016-2017 Title One Parent Meeting parents will be informed that Barbara Hawkins Elementary is a Title One school. Parents were informed about the policies and benefits of being a Title One school and encouraging parents to continue their involvement and their child's education.

At the monthly Coffee Talks organized by our Community Involvement Specialist, parents are provided at the end of each agenda the forum to openly discuss needs and suggestions on how to improve the student performance and parent participation. At the first meeting in October, it was suggested that the Resource Room be provided with an additional computer station where parents would be able to access resources.
