Parents will be given a copy of the parent handbook, which will include more detailed information on these topics. The parent student handbook will also be available on the school's website to facilitate parental access. During our Open House meeting, parents were invited to visit their child's classrooms and meet teachers. Monthly calendars will be distributed to parents in an effort to keep them abreast of school activities, such as PTA meetings, EESAC meetings, and assessments dates, etc. In addition, ConnectEd phones calls are made regularly as an additional strategy to help keep parents informed of school-wide activities. A parent conference slips will be kept in the main office and are accessible to all parents who would like to schedule a conference with teachers.
