Response: At the annual meeting of parents on September 15, 2014, Mae M. Walters Elementary School will hold a general meeting where information will be presented about the Title I program, the curriculum, and academic assessments. Parents will learn about the schoolwide program, how to schedule parent-teacher conferences, and opportunities for participation in decisions related to the education of their child. Parents will be given a copy of the Parent-Student Handbook, which includes more detailed information on these topics. Upon conclusion of the general meeting, parents will be invited to visit their child's classrooms and meet staff. During the classroom visits, teachers will provide additional information on the subjects they teach, assessment plans, and how parents can help at home. The same information will be provided in an informational packet distributed the following day for all parents unable to attend. Teachers will maintain sign-in sheets and provide a copy to the assistant principal who will also maintain documentation on the dissemination of information, distribution methods, and timelines.

In addition, Mae M. Walters Elementary has a Parent Resource Center where parents are encouraged to check out educational materials to assist their children with learning at home. The Parent Resource Center also provides assistance with accessing the Parent Portal, completing school forms, and serving as a bridge between the parents and the teachers.

BlackBoard Connect and event-specific flyers will be used to remind parents of school-site activities and to provide additional information about school-related events.

Parents are provided with a Parent Handbook at the beginning of each school year. This handbook contains specific information regarding policies for school-home communication. Parents are encouraged to schedule conferences with their child's teacher by calling the main office and requesting an appointment. Teachers may also request a conference by contacting parents through a letter, e-mail, or phone call. Evidence of these conferences is maintained in the teacher's Parent Communication Log. Written communication will be provided in the parent's home language, English or Spanish. Translators will be available to assist parents with conferences or written communications.

Written notifications about their child's academic progress will be provided for parents through the use of Progress Reports (distributed the fifth week of the grading period), and Report Cards (distributed quarterly). Assistance with the interpretation of these reports will be available at the Parent Resource Center. Parents will also be involved in the development of a Progress Monitoring Plan if their child needs additional assistance in an academic area.

Parents are encouraged to comment on the school's program at monthly Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and Educational Excellence School Advisory Council (EESAC) meetings. These suggestions are reflected in the meeting minutes.

These messages will be provided in the parent's home language. In addition, the school will host parent meetings on an array of subject areas and topics through The Parent Academy (TPA). Parents and teachers will meet to discuss their child's academic progress so that the child's strengths and weaknesses can be addressed. Teachers will conference with students who have Progress Monitoring Plans and contact parents regarding strategies either in person or over the phone. Parents will be encouraged to discuss their child's performance with the teacher any time during the school year.
