1	Title I, Part A	Bartow Middle School will use their Title I funds to provide supplemental instructional resources and interventions for students with academic achievement needs. Title 1, Part A, support provides after-school and summer instructional programs, supplemental instructional materials, resource teachers, technology for students, professional development for the staff, and resources for parents.
2	Title 1, Part C Migrant	Migrant students enrolled in BMS will be assisted by the school and the District Migrant Education Program (MEP). Students will be prioritized by the MEP for supplemental services based on need and migrant status. MEP Teacher Advocates monitor the progress of these high need students and provide or coordinate supplemental academic support. Migrant Home -School Liasons provide support to both students and parents in locating services necessary to ensure their academic success.
3	Title 1, Part D	Provides Transition Facilitators to assist students with transition from Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) facilities back to their zoned school. The Facilitators communicate with Guidance Counselors to facilitate the transfer of records and help with placement.
4	Title II	Title II funds provide professional development resources. School Technology Services provide technical support, technology training, and licenses for software programs. BMS has used Title II funds to purchase research based books on specific topics related to student development for our teachers.
5	Title III	Title III provides supplemental resources for English Language Learners (ELL) and their teachers in Title I schools, as well as professional development opportunities for the staff.
6	Title X- Homeless	The Hearth program, funded by Title X, provides support for homeless students. Title I provides support for this program, and many other activities through the Hearth Program.
7	Adult Education	Students are provided with information related to adult education options upon request.
