According to the Brevard Public Schools Elementary Parent Survey, 75.23% of our parents prefer to receive information about events and/or their child's progress through ClassDojo. Cape View teachers are utilizing ClassDojo this year to effectivity share information about events and/or individual student progress.
How will you get feedback from parents and families about the meeting?	Families are given a paper survey during our Title I Annual Meeting that encourages them to provide valuable feedback regarding the parent and family engagement activities and programs. Survey results will be used to design strategies to improve effective family engagement, remove possible barriers to parent participation, and revise the parent and family engagement plan.

Cape View has supplied every student with a school calendar and a school planner (for intermediate grades). This helps keep parents informed of assignments, and they serve as a good medium for notes back and forth between parents and teachers. In addition, every teacher utilizes ClassDojo to better communicate with their families, and we make sure to keep our school website and Facebook Page up to date throughout the school year.

Letters are sent home with every student that has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is out of field. A copy of the letter and a list of the parents who receive the letter is kept on file as documentation for auditing purposes.

During our Back to School Night/Annual Parent Meeting, parents will have the opportunity to visit their child's classroom. At this time, teachers will provide information regarding curriculum, achievement levels, grade level expectations, assessment plans, and how parents can help their child at home. In addition, parents are encouraged to sign-up for ClassDojo if they have not done so already, and also sign-up for FOCUS to monitor their child's progress throughout the school year. The same information is sent home for all parents unable to attend.

School informational flyers and documents that are uploaded to our school website and ClassDojo can easily be translated through those programs. In addition, school information that is sent home is translated in Spanish whenever possible. We also provide teachers with an iPad during parent-teacher conferences that may need assistance with translating.

At every workshop/event that Cape View provides to families, we collect feedback from all the participates to evaluate each family's thoughts and suggestions of the workshop/event offered. In addition, we collect sign-in sheets from all our workshops/events to calculate the number of families that participated. Lastly, at the end of the year, faculty, parents, and community members evaluate the family engagement events on our schools' frameworks to determine return on investment.
How will the needs of families be assessed to plan future events?	Results of parent surveys and exit slips are collected from families and are reviewed throughout the year by the Title I Team to determine needed changes.
What are the barriers for parents and families to attend workshops/events and how do you overcome these? (transportation, translation, etc)	Based on last year's parent survey, parents expressed that they are not able to sometimes attend workshops/events because it was not scheduled at convenient times. On this same survey, 64% of our parents selected that evenings (M-F) are the best times for them to attend a school event for families. To help overcome this barrier, we have scheduled most of our family workshops/events during the evening hours. In addition, we inform families on our school website, ClassDojo, and in our school newsletter that if they were not able to attend a family workshop/event, they may contact our Title I Contact (Michelle Wedel at wedel.michelle@brevardschools.org or 321-784-0284 ext. 3016) if they would like to know the information shared at an event.
How are flexible dates and times for meetings, events and/or workshops offered? (Give examples)	Cape View schedules events at varying times. For example, our "Student of the Month Breakfast" is scheduled for first thing in the morning before school starts. Our SAC and PTO meetings are scheduled for right after school, "Family STEAM Nights" are offered in the evening hours, and our award ceremonies are planned during the school day.
