Rationale for Evidencebased Strategy Backwards planning is a research based instructional technique that has been approved for use by the school district. The district has provided workshops to teach this practice and effective use in the classroom. Teachers at Youth Services have used this technique and have shown improvement in the Common Assessment used for students when comparing pre and post test scores.

- 1. Students take pre math and reading test within 10 days of enrollment
- 2. Data is collected and reviewed after pre test
- 3. Teachers will backwards plan for lessons to ensure topics and learning strands are covered.
