#### **Data Analysis**

#### What trends emerge across grade levels, subgroups and core content areas?

Through data analysis, the following trends emerged: The 6th-grade cohort outperformed their 7th and 8th-grade counterparts in ELA and MATH, while the 8th-grade cohort outperformed the 7th graders in Math only. The 6th graders as a whole consistently met adequate yearly progress; however, there may be concerns for an overall weakness in reading comprehension and grade 8 science standards mastery.

# What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2019 state assessments, demonstrate the greatest need for improvement?

Based on data from past state assessments and current progress monitoring the greatest need for improvement are in the areas of comprehension of informational text and number and operations,

with an average of roughly 50% of middle school students diagnosed at two or more grade levels below proficiency.

# What were the contributing factors to this need for improvement? What new actions would need to be taken to address this need for improvement?

The limitations due to the hybrid teaching model during the COVID pandemic added stressors to educators that were already facing challenges due to the previous year's academic gaps. Limited support personnel also played a role in hindering interventions and proper modeling to occur.

# What data components, based off progress monitoring and 2019 state assessments, showed the most improvement?

Through data analysis, the middle school Algebra I and Geometry students surpassed the state and district adequate yearly progress by 34% and 35% respectively.

# What were the contributing factors to this improvement? What new actions did your school take in this area?

Students that performed at or above grade level were encouraged to take accelerated courses in mathematics. They were explained the benefits of taking these accelerated courses and were eager to do well in initiating their high school grade point average. Having students with at or above grade level abilities coupled with impeccable work ethic set the proper foundation for the teachers to build upon. Our school offered the courses to students who felt they could handle the rigor and responsibility that came with enrolling in an accelerated course.

#### What strategies will need to be implemented in order to accelerate learning?

The instruction staff and intervention team will use an effective system to constantly progress monitor and verify learning so that critical missing skills and concepts can be identified. Once identified tasks can be personalized in order to maximize performance. In addition, tracking student progress through online components such as Study Island, Performance Matters, I-ready, and Flocabulary will serve as a guide when adjusting needed instruction.

Based on the contributing factors and strategies identified to accelerate learning, describe the professional development opportunities that will be provided at the school to support teachers and leaders.

A variety of professional development opportunities will be offered through frontline as curated through the Doral leadership institute. Surveys will be dispursed as a tool for needs assessments in subjects and best practices that faculty deem necessary. Topics such as data analysis, curriculum modification, effective use of best practices coupled with endorsement courses covering reading and ESOL will help cover a myriad of needs of our student population.
